Hints and Tips - Miscellaneous

- A simple and inexpensive way to create miniature ferns is to use green twist ties from dry cleaning. These are usually larger than your average garbage bag ties. Cut them to the appropriate shape, then, with a pair of pointed scissors, make a series of cuts up each side. The completed fern leaves can be curved to shape, then "planted" in a miniature planter. If the particular shade of green is not appropriate for your purposes, paint and shade with acrylic paints before cutting the fronds.
- Yet another use for baggie ties is as an emergency source of fine, pliable wire. In an emergency, just peel or slice off the paper wrapping and scrape any remainder away with a blunt blade and you have some useful wire for a variety of jobs. A great idea when you run out of wire late on a on Sunday night and the stores are closed.
- If you are looking for miniature pictures with equally miniature glazing, you could have your picture laminated
 in clear plastic before framing. Laminating is done inexpensively by most quick printing services, Michael's or
 even your neighbourhood license bureau.
- If you look carefully at packaging for cheap paint sets, you will see a number of depressions in the plasticf or .you to mix paints in. Carefully cut out, they make useful cereal bowls fore your kitchen.
- If you need some Halloween wallpaper, visit your local fabric store.... They have lots of small Halloween prints, tiny black and orange checks and plaids and cheaper than dollhouse wallpaper, too. They also have some black and orange braids and trims on sale that work well for ceiling trim and chair rails.

"Tool" of the Month - Leather Crafting Tools

When my mother was no longer able to do leather carving, her tools languished in the basement of her house for years. At least, they collected dust until I found them one day. These tools are hardened stainless steel and are designed to be used with a leather mallet (although a hammer works fine, too) on a very hard surface, like a granite countertop or a cement floor. I have been experimenting with them, and have found the following.

- 1. Used on balsa or basswood, the tools make a nice impression, and in combination, can emboss many patterns on the wood. Some of the tools (there are hundreds of designs) are merely used as a stamp, punching a variety of designs into the wood (e.g. acorns, eaves, flowers). Others are used to shape and inscribe the wood. When used to shape the wood (as in the two tops for chests illustrated), the pattern is first drawn on the wood. Where raised impressions are required, a sharp X-Acto knife is used to cut a line around the pattern to define the edge. The craft knife is then used to cut out the deepest holes. Then the bevellers and shapers can "raise" the design from the surface of the wood. (This requires a workshop demonstration to be really clear.... Sorry about that!)
- 2. Used with Fimo, the tools make hollows that can be used as moulds. When filled with plaster or resin, you can make a number of identical raised mouldings, architectural details, etc.



Leather tools can be purchased at Tandy Leather Factory, 17720 107 Avenue. Each tool costs about \$10.00 so you had better be very sure about what designs you want.... Or borrow from an actual leather crafter.
